Dear Parents and Carers,

Welcome to the latest edition of our newsletter. This one is particularly important to me as, according to the government's road map, we are close to having the school operating as normal again, from 21 June 2021.

Over the last 14 months we have tried our best to provide

our students with a safe environment to learn in and at the same time a rich curriculum for their attainment. I am delighted to say that we are planning to discontinue the bubble system on Monday 21 June. Our plan is to have the school back to normal for the last four weeks of Term 6, thus giving all of our students the opportunity to experience the full school offer. Our plan is to change everyone's timetable so students can experience curriculum areas such as, practical lessons in: science, Design and Technology, Drama and Art. More information about this will be with you shortly.

I am sure that by now you have received our offer for Summer School for our Years 7 and 8. Mr. Uffendell has worked really hard to create an amazing offer for our students that combines academic support but also outdoor experiences. I do hope you will take this opportunity and encourage your children to attend these days.

Equally important, we are planning further opportunities for our Years 9 and 10, for next year, in terms of extra school days and tuition when needed. Again, more information will be with you at the appropriate time.

As mentioned earlier, we are planning to bring the school back to its previous arrangements on 21 June. This will automatically mean that students must wear their full school uniform on a daily basis. They will not have to wear their PE kit on PE days anymore as the changing rooms will be operational. Furthermore, the government has announced that there will be a revised guidance for the use of face masks in school, around the middle of May, and we will let you know as soon as we have received this information. At this point, I would like to remind you that we expect all of our students to be equipped with the right uniform. Please refer to our if you are unsure. Also, please let us know if you need any help with the purchase of uniform.

Here, at PCSA, we pride ourselves in terms of our communication with parents and carers. We are always willing to get back to you addressing your concerns and have useful discussions. Ultimately, it is this process that will allow us to make the school better for all. However, I would like to remind you that Facebook will not give you any answers to these concerns or the opportunity of a useful dialogue with the school.

At this point I wold like to extend a warm welcome to our 300 new PCSA students who will join us in September 2021. I would also like to thank the parents and carers who once again have chosen PCSA for their child's education. As always, my pledge is that all PCSA staff are committed to the safety, progress and well-being of your children.

My final words are for our Year 11s. They have been brilliant and they are a fantastic bunch of young people; kind and resilient. We are committed to a process of fairness and transparency in terms of their GCSE grades and we have sent you the appropriate correspondence on this matter. Please contact myself or Mr. Uffendell if you need any clarification on this matter.

As always, I want to thank you personally for your support over the last 14 difficult months. Hopefully, the adversity of the past will create a stronger sense of community around us based on care and kindness for each other.

CEO's Message



Parents and carers,

Thank you for your super support over the last few months; we have really appreciated the many comments of support. March 2019 does seem a long time ago! We are now fully back.

It is great to see all our students back in our schools. The true value of 'face to face' education and the wider aspects of schooling have certainly been seen in this last year. I am now sure that our PCSA students and staff will delight, even more than normal, in the simple school processes of being with friends, riding a bike in each day or just taking part in the myriad of sport, drama and music 'after school' clubs on offer. Of course, this is never just 'after school' – it is part of the very fabric of what we mean by 'school'. These sorts of activities will continue to be a huge part of what we offer across our group of schools at PCSA, WCSA, TKASA, Castle Batch, East and West Huntspill, Pawlett and St Anne's – this is always a clear pledge from us. We will continue to make sure all our schools have a great 'after school' offer – it has always been a very strong part of our provision at PCSA.

We hope to have seen the end of lockdowns for a very long time. Again, thank you to all our PCSA parents, carers and students for your very good humour and patience through what has been a difficult time for us all. Unfortunately, a couple of our longer serving staff have been extremely ill during this terrible time – school staff are not exempt from COVID-19. We continue to wish them well in their long recovery. Throughout the pandemic we have been very mindful of staff welfare and safety and, as I note, bar a couple of staff, all is thankfully well. We now look optimistically forward to the next stage of TPLT's development with the primary schools with East and West Huntspill joining us on April 1st – this onboarding work has continued despite the pandemic. So, we will soon be a group of seven schools spread across nine sites - 5,200 students with 720 staff. We have a healthy balance sheet and have some audacious plans for this coming September; we think our MAT size is one which enables plenty of alignment and joint opportunities whilst not getting too big and thus too far ahead of ourselves – we have now a really excellent local offer for our families which is focussed on great outcomes for our students and a super place to work for our staff.

The purpose of TPLT is to advance education for public benefit. TPLT will facilitate knowledge building through professional development, with a determination to improve curriculum and pedagogy.

On March 1st we were delighted to see that PCSA had, once again, over 300 first choices for the new Year 7 entry. So, PCSA will have 300 new Year 7s joining Mr. Markoutsas and the dedicated team of staff this coming September. We were similarly really pleased to see WCSA's first choices increase by 11% - so, 256 new Year 7s are off to WCSA. We have also



been delighted to see the growth of the Sixth Form at TKASA (Highbridge), with 50 entering in 2018 to 100+ entering in Year 12 in September – this is fantastic. Please do consider TKASA, which has a great reputation of sending students to the very best universities, as an option if you have a son / daughter in Year 11. Have a look at the TKASA website and please do request a 'safe' tour of our Sixth Form should you wish. Many of our TKASA Sixth Formers are off to Oxford and Cambridge this year – great work by all involved.

We also have been working very hard 'behind the scenes' to advance our Alternative Provision (AP) and we hope in the next year or so to open two new AP centres in both WSM and Highbridge. These centres will cater for students who need extra behaviour support and guidance. Also, from September 2021, and planned before the pandemic, we propose to provide many more of our students with a Chrome Book - a Google enabled laptop. We now have 576 Chrome Books across our schools and we will be issuing another 733 devices in the secondary schools in May. Great work by Simon Merrick (Head of TPLT IT) and all our IT professionals.

More details on both of these exciting initiatives will soon follow from Nathan Jenkins, who is joining our Central Team as our Head of School Improvement on April 1st. My thanks to Gail Webb MBE, who has been in this role over last four years. Gail has done a really tremendous job bringing forward great improvements at both WCSA and TKASA in particular. As we all know, both schools were in the lowest OfSTED category of 'Special Measures' in the recent past – 2016 and 2018; they are certainly not there anymore. We wish Gail well, with our great appreciation.

As always, please do contact me directly if you need to talk about anything. I am very happy to assist at any time. All our staff will continue to make sure we reply quickly to all our parents and carers. We do produce a brief video update each term about all the great work we do as a Multi-Academy Trust – please have a look on school websites. Finally, remember we do have a thriving teacher training programme, as a MAT, which is fully funded and 'salaried'; if you know of anyone who would like to 'train to teach' from September 2021 or 22 please do get in touch. It's a great job.

The exam results at TKASA are excellent: from 2017 – 2020 students achieved or exceeded their A level target grades, in 2020 54.36% achieved A* - B grades and a 100% pass rate. In 2018 92%, 2019 79% and in 2020 84% of our students went up to a university of their choice!




KS3 Design & Technology

Mr Dodd's Introduction

Well, this has been an interesting term, hasn't it? I feel like I have spent more time in my house in front of a computer than any other period in my life -even my days as a gamer in the distant past! As I'm sure you've read in other parts of this newsletter, I have been bowled over by the attitude and dedication of our students during the periods of isolation or lockdown learning they have had recently. There has been a lot in the press about students needing to 'catch up' on 'lost learning', but this really doesn't match what we are seeing in the English classroom. Students are doing well in lessons, and the move from remote learning to classroom teaching during cycle 3 has been more or less seamless. Cycle 3, when all KS3 year groups are studying a novel, is my favourite part of the year in many ways. I love to see a group of students get really stuck into a whole story and react to their loved/hated characters' actions. I have particularly enjoyed reading the American classic Of Mice and Men with my Year 9 class. I am acutely aware that there are issues with this book, particularly its portrayal of the casual racism of 1930s America, and have made it a prime focus to develop our teaching of the text (and all of our schemes of work) to incorporate a greater diversity of stories and voices. This is an ongoing project, but an important one to which I am committed as a leader. If any parents would like to be involved in this process, please feel free to get in touch with me.

KS3 - Miss Morse

Our year sevens, eights and nines have risen to the challenge of learning both at home and at school - under some tricky circumstances. We are impressed by their resilience, dedication and continual efforts to succeed. Here are some of our Lockdown Champion Learners and champion learning. We salute all the parents at home that have juggled jobs, teaching and parenting - simultaneously - no easy task!

Year 7 have just finished Boy in the Striped Pyjamas by John Boyne and are moving onto the topic of autobiographical writing.

Year 8 are finishing the novel Trash by Andy Mulligan and are moving onto the next cycle of work which is working on different short stories and then crafting their own.

Year 9 have enjoyed studying Steinbeck's Of Mice And Men and in particular they have enjoyed discussing why Curley's wife is left intentionally nameless and why Lennie is an outsider. Please ask your year 9 about this you might be surprised at their response! Six KS3 students have been selected for publication in the 'Unsolved' Young Writers competition for their short stories written over lockdown.

Amelia Smart wrote The Day The Dead Came Back; Daisy Fielding wrote The Spiral Staircase; Ella Young wrote Death By Moonlight; Joshua Sowerbutts wrote The Murder Of Elmo; Lewis Adams wrote Nightmare In The Past; and Lilly-May Dewhurst wrote Fight Of A Reborn Soul. We are teaching our students not just the enjoyment of literature but how each writer has crafted the literature. This helps students to create their own and to be able to effectively analyse writing.





By now our students have become experts at learning wherever they are based. Cycle 3 was launched at home and online and then developed when we returned back in February. Upper School students have done this seamlessly and we have been so impressed with their determination and dedication.

Our focus in Year 11 has been on revising the key areas we have covered over the past two years and showing off how our skills have developed. We have been focusing on English Language, especially creative writing and analytical reading. We were so pleased to see so many Year 11s in during the Easter holidays for our Prep4Success revision session on A Christmas Carol, which they will be putting in to action after Easter. In Year 10, we have been studying 'Blood Brothers' the musical by Willy Russell. Whilst we may not have been able to take them to a performance this year, their reading in class and their Liverpudlian accents have been outstanding. We were hugely impressed with the number of Year 10s who came in during the Easter holidays to work on their creative writing skills, bringing a character to life. 
Since we have returned to school, we have been so impressed with the way all year groups have worked in their humanities lessons and we would like to thank you all for your hard work. As many of you may know at Christmas Mrs. Phelan retired and she has been well missed by the faculty; however, in her place Mr. Steven Hanney has joined the faculty and he has made an excellent start.

Humanities House Challenges

Since the start of January each week the humanities faculty has been running house challenges via the google classrooms for each teaching group. The students have had the opportunity to get involved in all sorts of activities from quizzes on world religions and flags; submitting interesting geography and history facts; as well as the geography photo challenge; and the World Book Day virtual library. We have been so impressed by how many students of all year groups, but especially of Key Stage Three, have participated. Every entry has earned students house points and in total, since the start of cycle 3, students have earned in excess of 25,000 house points through the humanities challenges, student of the week nominations and excellent piece of work nominations. These challenges will continue throughout the year so remember to check your google classroom each week as well as following @HumanitiesPCSA for more details.

One of the most impressive and exciting challenges we got involved with earlier in the term was linked to Fairtrade Fortnight. The Fairtrade Foundation asked students in the UK to create a piece of work in any form that they wished under the theme of Choose The World You Want. 


It has been an unusual year so far in school and in the ICT department. As always, I am really pleased with the way our staff and students have risen to the challenges presented to them and have continued to find new ways of teaching and learning. We yet again have had record numbers of students choosing our subjects in the Year 9 options and look forward to delivering new and exciting ICT based courses in the near future.





Our Year 8 students have been learning all about encryption and how to encrypt and decipher secret messages. They have used encryption methods invented by the ancient Romans (the Caesar Cipher) as well as using their reading books to encrypt messages using a book cipher, a technique that has been used in the past by secret agents and spies! Also in Cycle 3, Year 8s have been learning all about how computers represent and store images and the main types of computer images (Bitmap and Vector). In Cycle 4, Year 8s will be working on a unit that covers the history of computing as well as looking at the ethical and legal implications of using ICT.

KS3 Lessons

Year 7 have been learning all about computer systems and have also excelled in their work with the binary and hexadecimal numbering systems. Binary and hexadecimal are numbering systems that use base two (1 and 0) and base 16 (0-9 then a, b, c, d, e, f) to represent numbers, systems that are used extensively in computer science. Students have also been investigating what the main components of a computer are and what their functions are, such as CPUs, motherboards, RAM and hard drives. In Cycle 4 they will be moving on to a Marketing unit which is linked in to our Business Studies qualification in KS4.











Year 9s have been learning all about Computer Games design, including designing their own characters, games and controllers as well as finding out about the different job roles involved in computer games design such as Graphic artist and World Designer. In Cycle 4, Year 9 students will be moving onto a Business Studies unit which links into our KS4 Business Studies course.






In KS4 we have students studying: Business, Computer Science and Creative iMedia (ICT). Our Year 10 Creative iMedia students have been working very hard to complete their story boards and visualisation diagrams for their practise coursework, and have since moved on the real coursework where they have been demonstrating their knowledge about composition and layout in digital products.







Year 10 Enterprise & Marketing (Business) students have similarly been working through their practise coursework, where they learned to create questionnaires, design products suitable for a target group of customers and also work out profit and loss and when their imaginary company would break even. They have also now moved onto their actual coursework, where they have been demonstrating their knowledge about Customer Profiles and Market Segmentation.



Thank you to all of our wonderful students. We can't wait to have you all back in science labs (hopefully) very soon!


KS4 Science

Our Year 11 students are truly determined to succeed in science and are highly focused towards the end goal. Students continue to produce as much fantastic work in school as they did remotely. The vast majority of students are electing to put extra time towards their work (at home, during tutor time and in our Prep for Success sessions) to ensure that they are completely confident with the content.



Our Year 9 and 10 students produced some fantastic work remotely. As teachers, it really made our day when work such as shown above was submitted!

Our Year 10 students have been learning about infection and disease including how vaccinations work and how new drugs are developed - incredibly relevant topics!



Our Year 9 students have enjoyed learning about the digestive system, the cardiovascular system, effects of exercise and cancer, just to name a few!

KS3 Science

WOW! Our KS3 students never fail to amaze us. They have again had to move to another new normal but their resilience and determination has been outstanding. We cannot express the excitement that was felt across the school when our students returned to face-to-face learning.

Recent terms have seen some challenges for the students, but again we have witnessed a high level of engagement with outstanding work being completed.

The students are really starting to develop their confidence within science and are gaining new skills in abundance. As such, it is important for us to recognise that the students have gained much more than science knowledge; they have become effective communicators, both in the classroom and through the google classrooms. Even more apparent they have shown outstanding organisation skills, by being ready to learn and being equipped for lessons and organising themselves to follow the timetables through remote learning. These skills are life skills that will serve them well in the future.

Year 7 have been completing topics on substances and particles and electric circuits, and they will be moving onto interdependence.

Year 8 have completed work on acids and bases and have been able to see demonstrations in the classrooms.

We have also seen big successes on Tassomai, our home learning platform. Many of the students are achieving high accuracy and completed more than the required number of daily goals. Through lockdown we challenged the students to become "Tassomai" heroes this was a huge success and the amount of daily goals surpassed all our expectations.

If restrictions are lifted, I will once again be running the transition science club for Year 6, where students will get a first-hand glimpse at the outstanding science facilities on offer.



We have so many activities lined up for next year with plans being made for students to get more "hands on" as science should be. There really are exciting times ahead

STEM:

Since Christmas we have been very busy trying new ways to engage with STEM activities and have had some brilliant results. On our return from lockdown we ran a "Careers in Science" seminar that everyone thoroughly enjoyed (myself included, even if I am too tall to be an astronaut). This seminar can be found on the distanced science club google classroom for anyone who missed it.



We have also celebrated British science week. This would normally include scientist hunts and big exciting demos but due to COVID we had to do something a bit more home based but equally ambitious. So we set the challenge of five practicals in five days via Google Classroom, with activities in many areas of science. We had some fantastic results; the most impressive of which was awarded to our Science Week Challenge winner Aisha in Year 7 who grew the above giant crystals over the week.

Tassomai

Students at PCSA have continued to work hard with their home learning using the online platform "Tassomai". Since returning from lockdown, we have seen a 35% increase in students engaging with the platform which is clearly demonstrating their drive and ambition to succeed. We have recently launched 'Parent Reports' with a weekly personalised email detailing the work completed by your child on the platform for that week, including where their strengths and weakness lie. Parent Reports mean that you can become more involved in your child's learning and can help encourage their progress from home. You will have access to your own "overseer" account where you can access your child's progress tree (please see the image to the right) to identify the areas that they may need to focus on. Some of our top performers from this term can be found below:



Each of these students (and many more) regularly complete more than their expected number of daily goals, which indicates true dedication and ownership of their own learning and progress. We look forward to seeing the impact of this program over the coming years.

Prep for Success/Easter School

This year we have seen the start of Prep for Success and Easter school for both Year 11 and Year 10. These are opportunities for students to get help with specific maths topics.

For Year 10 we have concentrated on topics that were covered during lockdown periods to help students to gain confidence and improve their maths. So far we have covered ratios, surface area and volume of 3D shapes, trigonometry, straight line graphs and Venn diagrams.



For Year 11 the focus has been on preparing students for their assessments to help support their grades. This has involved Walking Talking Mocks and use of calculator.



Extra Help

At the moment we are not running the normal after school sessions. However, your child can still get help. Make sure they are you on the relevant Maths Google Classroom for their maths class

and they can send message to their teachers asking for specific help. Check out the pcsa.org.uk website for all the information about accessing the google classrooms that have been set up. If you need any more help with this please email me lois.kerrison@pcsa.org.uk

The importance of a calculator

Many students believe that if they are not doing the maths in their head they are not a good mathematician. However, a good mathematician uses the tools they have available to them and the most important one of those is the calculator. Using a calculator is not cheating, you still have



to know what to put into the calculator and that is the mathematical part. Yes, it is important for your son/daughter to be able to add/subtract/ multiply /divide and do simple calculations, however, more important is knowing when to use their calculator to help them. Please encourage your son/daughter to use their calculator to help them with their homework. We recommend the Casio FX-83GTX as a good scientific calculator which is helpful not only in maths, but in science, D&T, geography, and any other topics which requires mathematical calculation.

Hegarty Maths - UPDATE

So far this year we have answered over 350,000 questions, nearly 8000 hours of learning and over 11,000 pieces of feedback. Still hoping we can reach our target however we have had a bit of set back due to lockdown.

Your child does not have to only do quizzes and watch videos set by their teacher. They can use it to help on lots of different topics and earn house points for their effort. Every week the three top students in each year group earn house points for their house and at the end of each cycle we give house points for the top 10 uses in each year group. So it all helps to make your house the best.





Citizenship

The intent of Citizenship education at PCSA is to equip students with a core knowledge of the subject, emphasising how modern Britain works and demonstrating how students can play a functioning role in society. During tutor time,


